And to Sami. A Greyhound rescued from the harsh life of racing. Six years ago, Sharon and Sami started a program that paired residents of the juvenile detention center with therapy teams. Suddenly hard-core kids were feeling grateful for the opportunity to interact with Sami and the dogs that were to follow.

After a thorough screening process, Sami and Sharon were brought into the juvenile court to comfort and support children testifying about the trauma inflicted upon them by trusted adults. And the children were grateful that Sami stood by them.

There were lighter moments too. Like when Sami was asked to be a model in an art class. Sami was always drawn to children. Now they were drawing her.

Sami was released from this life just a few short weeks ago. She and Sharon enjoyed a distinguished career as a therapy team. Sami was a teacher and a healer. A kind and gentle soul we were all grateful to have known.

His name was Edwin. I imagine him today heading back to high school anticipating all the "firsts" of adolescence. His first car, his first prom, his first heartbreak. Most of all, I picture him alive.

I met him at the hospital when he was 12, though he looked more like 10. I could smell the poison in his blood. The doctors called it leukemia. It left him pale and listless. Edwin liked dogs but his were smaller. To him, I must have looked like my friend Sasha the Mastiff. It took us awhile to hit it off.

Edwin and his mother would come and go from the hospital. When they stayed, it was for days at a time while Edwin got his treatment. He was very weary one day and his mother asked Francine the nurse if I could get in bed with him. She placed a blanket across the bed. Edwin pounded the bed with his hand, and I hopped up. It made him laugh. Me too.

Yes, dogs laugh - mostly at humans.

Edwin passed the time by drawing and reading. One day, he showed us a book of his sketches. They were mostly cartoon characters that he had created. Each face was as unique as a paw print. He liked to read to me when I got in bed with him. Comic books, mostly.

One day we were walking down the corridor towards his room when I heard the familiar pounding of Edwin's hand on the bed. Someone must have tipped him off that we were coming. I pulled ahead and started to whimper, frustrated that I had to remain on leash when Edwin was calling for me. But Francine smiled and said it

would be okay.

The leash dropped to the floor, and I scampered down the hallway, crashing into the door frame as I veered left into Edwin's room (hospital floors are slick!) and launched my body airborne, landing squarely in the middle of Edwin's bed. He squealed and laughed. His mother said it was the first time he had done so all week.

So, this became our routine for a while. Edwin pounded and the humans looked the other way while I tore down the corridor in search of my friend. A short time later, Francine told us Edwin was going home. He was in remission.

On our last day together, he gave us the picture at the top of this article. A sketch he had drawn. Of me. There were tears. Yes, dogs cry too.

My next therapy class at PetSmart will begin on Sunday, October 24 at 4:00 pm. Therapy classes meet for 6 weeks, and each session lasts an hour.

Canine Good Citizenship certification is recommended but not required. Please pass this onto friends and family but tactfully mention that this is not a course for dogs and handlers who have not had some basic level of positive training. The cost is \$129.

Register and pay for the class in store or on-line at <a href="https://www.petsmart.com/">https://www.petsmart.com/</a>. Therapy classes typically fill up so register earlier than later.
